Our pilgrimage began on Sunday evening with a short ritual led by our spiritual companion, Sister.

Maria Lazzaro pbvm, followed by dinner at Ireland's oldest pub.

Our first full day was spent visiting the oldest Presentation school in Ireland at Georges Hill. Lunch was provided by the Presentation Sisters residing at Georges Hill. Our afternoon involved an exploration of Presentation history and a delve into the archives with Sr Marie-Therese King pbvm.

The International Presentation Symposium, hosted at the Presentation Sisters' Acorn Centre in Warrenmount was an outstanding experience of collegiality, friendship, learning and passion for Presentation education.

We heard innovative presentations and sharing from both Australian and Irish Presentation schools and were introduced to some of the other Presentation initiated or collaborative ministries including iScoil and work with Prison Ministry.

A highlight of the occasion was the visit from Ireland's Education Minister, Norma Foley for an address and a formal 'cutting of the cake'. She was a "Pres girl" and had previously taught at a Presentation school.

Our final day in Dublin, before heading to Ballygriffin was spent visiting Colaiste Bride Presentation Secondary School, Clondalkin. We met with the delightful students and staff and heard about the ways in which they uphold and engage with Presentation charism. We then travelled to Kildare visiting Saint Brigid's Well, before arriving in Ballygriffin, the birthplace of Nano Nagle. We were treated to a traditional Irish roast lovingly prepared by the Sisters that care for the place. Our first evening at Ballygriffin concluded with a reflective gathering led by Maria.

### Reflections from our Pilgrims

"It was incredible to see originals of Nano's letters at the George's Hill convent in Dublin. I felt like the years between me and Nano vanished just for a moment."

"Time for reflection and socialising together to deepen the experience was carefully woven into the fabric of each day and when the pilgrims gathered for dinner that night at Dublin's oldest pub, there was an opportunity to get to know each other and to cement our path as pilgrims."

"I contemplated how our evolving demographic challenges us to continue Nano's mission with creativity and adaptability, echoing the call to be a living expression of God's mission as Presentation People."

"Minister Norma Foley's address underscored the ethos of being "OF Pres and FOR Pres," resonating deeply with the symposium's theme of embodying Presentation values in education."





For most of us our first day at Ballygriffin began by taking the "Cosmic Walk" within the grounds of Ballygriffin.

The Cosmic Walk is a series of 16 reflections on the creation story celebrated through sculpture and word.

Our morning was then filled with discussion on the history of Ballygriffin and its significant connection to Nano's childhood.

Sister Anne Lyons pbvm shared an inspiring workshop with us based on the Icon of Nano Nagle and explained her role as Postulator for the Cause of Nano Nagle.

In the afternoon we visited Monanimy Castle, where we searched the graveyard for Nagle names, visited Killavullen Church where it is understood that Nano was baptised, before participating in a moving liturgy at the Mass Rock where Catholics went to Mass during the time of the Penal Laws.

On our final day at Ballygriffin, the 240<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Nano Nagle's death (26<sup>th</sup> April), we were privileged to join the Presentation community across Ireland in the celebration of "handing over the keys" of the Ballygriffin property back to the Presentation Sisters.

My dear Australian Pilgrim Teachers, Greetings and love to each one of you. I take such delight in knowing how my little dream has evolved right across the globe and you are a wonderful expression of that dream. And I remember the beginnings... the journey... the fidelity of our God. You see it has pleased the Almighty to make me succeed, when I had everything as I may say, to fight against... I began in a poor, humble manner; and though it pleased the divine Will to give me severe trials in this foundation, yet it is to show that it is His work and has not been effected by any human means... I can't too much admire your zeal and great trust in the divine Providence which I always looked on as the most settled beginning any foundation of this kind could have. Providence has ordered everything for the best in her regard to keep her for this place... We must think the Almighty permits everything for the best. You'll see with His assistance everything promises well. I must say every disappointment we have had the Almighty has been pleased to make it turn out to our advantage; though my impatience very often made (me) not submit to His divine Will as I ought. But the Almighty is sufficient and will soon make up this loss to us. By degrees with the assistance of God we may do a great deal. ... It's all in the power of the Almighty; we don't know what is best for us and so ought to be resigned to the divine Will. The Almighty makes use of the weakest means to bring about His works. We must leave it to the Almighty; He (will) do everything for the best in it, I hope. I don't approve of your desponding so much as I perceived in your last letter. Though (neither) you nor I should not (sic) live to see it prosper in our time, yet I hope it may (prosper) hereafter and be of universal service to the kingdom. I comfort myself with this thought when I am most dejected at the many disappointments I have met with. With God's assistance everything promises well. I am so proud of you. With my love and blessing. Nano Nagle

Having travelled to Cork the previous evening our first day was spent at the nearby ports of Cobh and Kinsale. This was the departure point for many of the Presentation Sisters as well as many of those of us with Irish ancestry.

Some of the highlights of this visit were the imposing St. Colman's Cathedral in Cobh, and the warmth and cosiness of family-run "The Tap Tavern" in Kinsale.

Day 8, our Sunday in Cork, was a special day. We celebrated the Eucharist at the Tomb of Nano, which was a sacred experience for all of us as pilgrims.

This was followed by gourmet lunch at Ballymaloe House.

On Day 9, we returned to Nano Nagle Place (where we had celebrated Mass) for a series of presentations from the various Presentation Ministries housed within Nano Nagle Place. This was followed by a guided tour of the museum and a liturgy at Nano's tomb led by Sister Prema and Sister Margaret. Sister Bride walked us literally in the footsteps of Nano. We retraced some of the laneways of Cork that Nano would have walked, from South Presentation Convent to North Presentation Convent. We visited some of Nano's other schools along the way, including the school in Philpott Lane. Our arrival at North Presentation Convent will be a precious memory for us all. We were welcomed by the Sisters with such joy and warmth who had prepared us a delicious lunch for us to enjoy. It was Presentation hospitality in all its glory.



Today we took "the road less travelled" where our incredibly able bus driver, Billy took us down narrow laneways into the Kerry countryside with our final destination being Killarney. We visited the beautiful lake and chapel at Gougane Barra; the village of Kenmare and journeyed along parts of the Ring of Kerry.

This was the only day that we had experienced any rain. In the evening toasted the birth of a pilgrim's grandchild at a traditional Killarney Whiskey Tavern.


The next morning whilst some of us further explored the town of Killarney a group headed to the Abbey at Muckross House. It is mostly in ruin, but this fifteenth century former Franciscan Friary was a spiritual gem with its "sacred tree". We travelled through the historic village of Kilkenny towards the evening's destination Brooklodge and Macreddin Village in County Wicklow in preparation for our visit to Glendalough.

The last day of our pilgrimage took us to Glendalough, the monastic settlement of St. Kevin.

We continued our journey to Portarlington to Mount Saint Anne's Retreat Centre to experience the "Heart Aflame" which encompasses a sense of the global Presentation mission. The exhibition was accompanied by a talk given by Sister Elizabeth Maxwell pbvm.

Maria led us in our final reflection in a gentle way, weaving together the threads of our pilgrimage and all departed for Dublin feeling an overwhelming sense of gratitude for the journey that was. We gathered for a final meal as a pilgrimage group before going our own separate ways the following morning.
