Introduction

From the humble beginnings of a religious congregation being formed in Ireland in the eighteenth century, a global movement known as the Presentation Sisters emerged.

In recent decades a major collaborative undertaking led to the formation of the International Presentation Association (IPA).

Today, the IPA involves more than 1,600 Religious Sisters and Presentation People in over 20 countries across the world.

This is the IPA's strategy for the period 2020-2022.

The title of our new strategy is 'Education and Action for Justice'. It builds on the remarkable progress of the IPA and helps bring about greater focus for a way forwards in an increasingly uncertain and volatile world.

The image of a river on the front cover was chosen to represent the movement and energy of this strategy which will lead the IPA in a direction in keeping with the life and spirit of the Presentation Sisters.

This strategy development process took place at a gathering in Staten Island, New York in October 2019. It stemmed from Commitment 5 from the 2017 IPA Assembly.

IPA Commitments

We Presentation People will:

- Respond to the cry of Earth and to people made poor by embracing the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in a human rights framework, addressing the issues of women and children, care of Earth and indigenous peoples, as is relevant to our local regions.
- 2. Establish an interim task group to determine the appropriate organisational structure for IPA to achieve its mission.
- Establish an interim advisory group consisting
 of the three IPA directors and others with
 expertise in global work, human rights,
 development and advocacy that will put into
 place a new organisational structure for IPA.
- 4. Review all IPA role descriptions.
- 5. Develop a strategic plan for IPA.
- Review the criteria for representation at IPA assemblies.
- Continue to use current capital from the IPA fund and welcome any extra donations as we identify other sources of fundraising.
- 8. Continue to have an IPA assembly every five years.
- Continue to include the IPA justice contacts as part of the IPA assembly.
- Continue to work toward collaboration and partnership building.

Our Story

The story of the Presentation Sisters emerged 300 years ago, and the International Presentation Association came into existence 30 years ago. It is a very small part of the huge and evolving story of our Universe and the mystery of God.

Nano Nagle

The late 18th Century in Ireland was a time of great hardship, where a largely uneducated population struggled to survive. In this context, Nano Nagle - a woman of wealth, education, social status and courage, having grown up by the Black Water River and surrounded by nature - found herself exposed to this new world in which people felt powerless and endangered.

Inspired by what she encountered, she dedicated herself to reducing poverty. She was committed to educating marginalised children in Ireland. Nano's zeal for the care of people and her compassionate presence guided her "If I could be of any service in saving souls in any part of the globe, I would do all in my power (Letter 1)". She encouraged other women to join her in caring for and educating those in need.

Presentation Sisters

Before her death in 1784, Nano founded a religious congregation. In faith and courage, two sisters of this new religious congregation were committed to live in her spirit to bring about her vision.

Over a period of many years, the movement grew very considerably and became established worldwide as the Presentation Sisters. The sisters predominantly focussed their efforts on creating and staffing schools that educate young people, especially girls.

International Presentation Association

During the 200th anniversary year of Nano Nagle's death, a large international gathering took place. The people that attended represented the three global units of Presentation Sisters. In the spirit of contemplative reflection, they were overwhelmingly convinced that they could do more together than alone. This led to the formation of the International Presentation Association in 1988.

The IPA continues to expand in influence. Notably, in 1999, accreditation with Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) status at the United Nations, gave the sisters working at community level a global platform to be a more effective 'voice for the voiceless'. A global consciousness expanded to embrace a deeper understanding of the relationship between vulnerable communities and the environment. Since then, three key priorities have emerged: Women and Children, Care of the Earth and indigenous and tribal people. Today, the IPA involves more than 1,600 Religious Sisters and Presentation People in over 20 countries across the world, working together to address Education and Action for Justice.



- Increase our presence at the UN in New York: To increase presence, engagement and collaboration at the United Nations in New York whilst strengthening awareness about the Sustainable Development Goals and Human Rights Framework across the IPA network.
- **Identify a specific advocacy focus:** To identify a specific advocacy focus based on a consultative process with Justice Contacts.
- **Develop an implementation plan:** To develop a plan to take forward advocacy on the specific focus point identified, including through key mechanisms (e.g. participation in Universal Periodic Review Process; lobbying and negotiating with Permanent Mission representatives and other officials).
