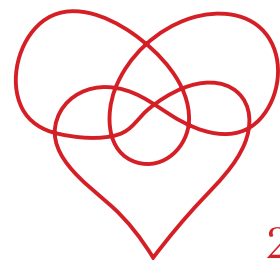

Finding Nano: an enigmatic Irishwoman and her legacy

This keynote address explores the life of Nano Nagle, drawing on sources that were uncovered while I was researching the book *Nano Nagle, the Life and the Legacy*. What are the elements of her childhood and youth that help us to better understand the woman that she became? What trajectory did her life take, that resulted in the founding of the Sisters of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary (PBVM)? What are the myths about Nano, and how did they develop? Who was the 'real' Nano, and – perhaps most importantly of all – what was her legacy to education? These are the questions that will be addressed in this keynote.



The discourse will introduce the audience to details about her life that help to shine a light on how she managed to influence so many people in her lifetime. Importantly, that influence continued after her death. The keynote address explores how that influence continued, and how she left a legacy that can still be found around the globe today.

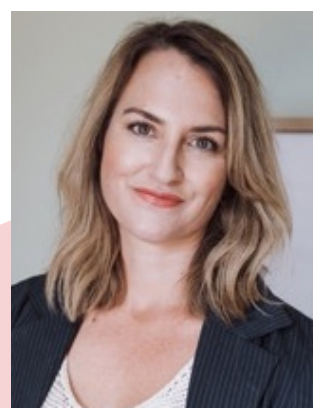

Professor Deirdre Raftery, University College Dublin, Ireland

What did Nano really say? Working with the surviving words of Nano Nagle

The aim of this workshop is to explore how the past – and Nano's voice – can be relevant to your work as educators and leaders. The workshop draws its impetus from my interest in the surviving writings in the hand of Nano Nagle, all of which I digitised in collaboration with UCD Digital Library.

The session will begin with some background work on how the contemporary world can benefit from listening to voices from the past. The 'uses of the past' for our school students will also be addressed.

We will then look at Nano Nagle's writings as an example of 'uses of the past', as we divide into small groups. I will provide all the groups with facsimile copies of Nano's letters, written in the 1760s and 1770s, and we will workshop sections of those letters to hear her voice and to decode her message for today.

When our groupwork is complete, we will have a focused whole-group discussion on the salient messages in her writings and consider ways that educators can interpret her vision today.

To conclude the session, I will refer to a recently-designed project called PINNACLE, hosted at University College Dublin in collaboration with the Presentation Sisters (North East Union, Ireland), which fosters links with Presentation schools in India and Pakistan. Findings from research with teachers in those schools points to ways in which they continue to refer to, and interpret, Nano's words in the 21st century.

Learning / Education

Sharon Schubert, Numeracy Enhancement Specialist - Maths Teacher, Iona Presentation College, Perth

Integrating research findings and efficacious pedagogical practices

This workshop will focus on appreciating the specific characteristics of the Alpha generation and explore how to adapt our teaching methods to better meet current and future needs. As educators we will consider the necessary skills and knowledge needed to navigate a changing world; one which demands flexibility, adaptability, and creativity. Strategies for creating dynamic and engaging learning environments, which fully prepare all students for the challenges and opportunities of the 22nd century, will be discussed. As learning communities, we will envisage how we can look to the future with interest and enthusiasm, and create vibrant, inclusive spaces that inspire our students to fully engage in their learning journey, discover new possibilities and successfully thrive and survive in the new world of work.

Prioritising Connection: PILLARS

In a climate of unprecedented levels of anxiety and mental health challenges amongst young people, St Mary's College is developing effective programs and strategies for their students. This workshop is designed for educators who are looking for an evolving wellbeing program that supports the growth of social and emotional skills by promoting resilience, building self-esteem and a positive attitude. Central to the PILLARS program are experiential learning opportunities that focus on four key elements: Connection to Spirituality, Relationships, Land and Culture, and Resilience. It is underpinned by Positive Education principles so our girls can be articulate, problem solvers who think outside the square, who pursue excellence and are comfortable with change.

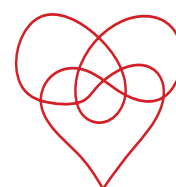

Developing Reflection Walks for Presentation Schools

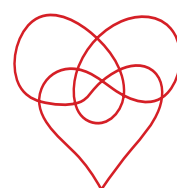

Wellbeing, Access and Enrichment

Wellbeing has become a broad and all-encompassing term in the school landscape. In response to the increasing number of young people with social and emotional needs in the secondary school setting, St Mary's College designed and implemented a support pathway which enables students to access learning while supporting their social and emotional needs. In a co-presentation from Andrew Clarke, Director of Senior School and Dee Spaulding, Learning Leader of Lantern (Learning Support), this process will be explained and examined, including the collaborative, multi team approach and use of resources within the school. In addition, this session will explore the role of Wellbeing, the development of wellbeing plans and how instrumental they are in capturing student voice and providing key information vital for setting our young people up for success.

Sharing the Spirit of Nano – A Staff Formation Program

We recognise the importance of lifelong learning in our Presentation faith communities and as such, our staff play an integral role in “sharing the spirit of Nano” in their everyday interactions in our Presentation Schools. Hear from Gemma who has developed a Staff Formation Program that complements the College's Strategic Plan and Vision for Learning. Working closely with the Presentation Sisters in Western Australia, and in particular Sister Anna Fewer pbvm, this formation program aims to inspire staff to keep the Presentation story and spirit alive in our educational communities. Gemma will share the catalyst for the formation program, together with an overview of the two-year professional development journey, workshop some examples with participating staff, share participant feedback and suggest how schools may adopt their own formation programs in their local context.

Keep the Lantern Burning

An interactive workshop on nurturing and reimagining the Presentation charism into the future using the 2022 publication by Mercy Partners.

Learning / Education

Kathy Strelow, Head of Religious Education, St Ursula's College, Yeppoon, QLD

Who is this Jesus bloke? Building self-efficacy beliefs in teachers of Religious Education in Catholic schools.

For many teachers in Catholic schools, teaching Religious Education can be daunting and even, overwhelming. The changing nature of Catholic schools means that teachers regularly come with little knowledge and experience of the Catholic faith tradition and are asked to deliver content in increasingly pluralist contexts. A Master's degree Capstone Project was undertaken in 2022 on how best to support RE teachers working at St Ursula's College, Queensland. It focused on two areas: the factors that impact on self-efficacy beliefs of RE teachers and the support required to improve these beliefs. This interactive session presents the findings of this original research and proposes some possible solutions to the challenge of supporting teachers of RE both now and in the future.

FLITT- Faith and Liturgy Team @ Star: Servant Leadership development in the Faith and Liturgy space throughout the school.

This workshop will explore models and practices of student servant leadership inspired by Nano Nagle and the Presentation charism that aim to enliven students' understanding and experiences of being inspirational leaders to the younger students.

Throughout the year each Liturgy and Faith-in-action activity has its own FLITT team led by the Year 11/12 Leaders to increase student voice and understanding of faith matters. This in turn develops students to take on roles to ensure positive change and remain contemporary and relevant.

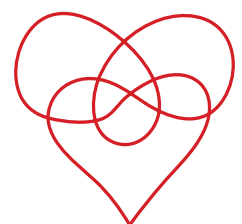

Professor Deirdre Raftery is a historian of education, at University College Dublin, Ireland. She is an elected Fellow of the Royal Historical Society and had been a Visiting Fellow at the University of Oxford and the University of Toronto and held a Fulbright at Boston College. Her 13th book publications include the acclaimed Nano Nagle, the Life and the Legacy. Other recent books include *Irish Nuns and Global Education: a Transnational History 1830-1930* (2023), *Teresa Ball and Loreto Education: Convents and the Colonial World, 1794-1875* (2022), and *New Turns in the History of Education in Ireland: From Policy to Practice, from Theory to Lived Reality* (2023).

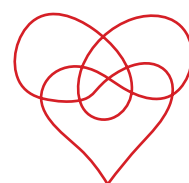
A wide choice of accommodation surrounds the waterfront with options marrying Hobart's relaxed style to its colonial heritage.

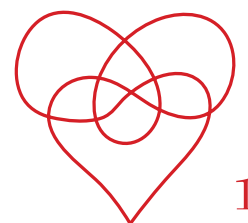

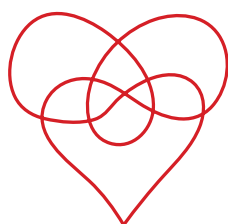
