

#### Mater Dei, ventures out to the margins...

Our Team of Street Retreat Students and Teachers travel to Melbourne each year to work with the Homeless and disadvantaged. The students spend time visiting the Exodus Community, and working with Brother Doug and Brother Harry, considering the levels of social injustice and disadvantage and contributing to support services such as the Vinnies Soup Van, that operates a night time service in Melbourne's CBD. Students are challenged to step outside their own comfort zones and approach Homeless people on the streets, offering them a gift, conversation or sustenance.













Mater Dei Catholic College aspires to be more like Nano Nagle and to follow in her footsteps. To show this we regularly do what we can to help in the community. This year Mater Dei students have been seen working in the Green Team and Vinnies winter appeal. The Green Team help those in need with garden problems and lend a hand to clean up. ## Sister Barbara Webber (PBVM)... A proud House Patron

We are lucky to have Sister Barbara Webber as one of our 5 House Patrons. Sister Barbara came to Wagga when she was 6 months old and is currently following her vocation as a Presentation Sister. Sister Barbara joined the Presentation sisters and went on to become a Teacher, teaching in Ganmain, Sydney, Urana and Henschke. She spent the majority of her career as a teacher at Mount Erin High School, where she taught the Commercial class and ended up as the Pastoral Care Coordinator from 1992 to 2000.



Sister Barbara became the manager of Micah House when she left Mount Erin and personally raised awareness of the needs of the homeless and raised the funds needed to keep Micah House running. She has also been involved with Sunflower House. Erin Earth and the Kairos Outside programme.

Through these commitments her vocation, Sister Barbara has been an exemplary role model of what it means to be a Presentation Sister, by burning the was flame that was lit by Nano Nagle.

The Webber House Shield has an emerald green background that represents the background of the Presentation Sisters, coming from Ireland. Sister Barbara's inspiration, Nano Nagle is represented by the glowing lantern. We can see through Sister Barbara's work, her ability to bring light and joy to the people of the community who need it most. The calligraphy pen illustrates Sr Barbara's academia and attention to pastoral care when corresponding throughout regional farming families and individuals when needed.

Sister Barbara's order of the Presentation Sisters is shown in the contemporary representation of the cross and insignia are symbolic of the Presentation Sisters. These features of the Webber shield encapsulate the values and purpose of Sr Barbara Webber, who we are lucky to have as a visitor to all our special events at the College.




#### **The Heritage Centre - Mount Erin**

This year in Wagga Wagga we saw the opening of the Mount Erin Heritage Center, dedicated to the Sisters who helped the community back in the early days of establishing the convent and associated Schools.

In 1874, a group of five nuns left their home in Ireland, bound for a new life half a world away in Wagga Wagga. This year, they opened the first ever Presentation School in Australia, referred to as the 'Stable School' pictured to the right.

In 1876, they opened the Convent and associated School, known as Mt Erin, pictured below. It was always a dream of Sister Barbara's to see our shared History preserved in such a special way. The Sisters now open the Heritage Centre to the public.

Last Tuesday we had the privilege of attending the Tercentenary Opening Ceremony - Ritual of the Lanterns. This special occasion begun our period of celebration of Nano's life's work and mission being realised among Presentation Schools across Australia.

The Opening Ceremony took place at the Cathedral, the site of the original 'Stable School' established by 5 Presentation Sisters, when they first arrived in Wagga in 1874. Shortly after this they commissioned and built Mt Erin Convent and Schools in 1876.
