Venerable Nano Nagle

- Born in Cork, Ireland.
- Eldest of 6 children.
- Sent to France for an education
- Wealthy young lady.
- Attended balls, parties outings whilst in France.
- Noticed contrast between those living a privileged life and the poor.
- Wanted to educate the poor and voiceless.
- Went back to Ireland and opened a number of schools.
- Faced many challenges. Often insulted. Her students were seen as beggars.
- Streets at night visiting the needy.... thus given the nickname 'The Lady with the Lantern'. Presentation Sisters were born.









MDCC Founders

Blessed Edmund Rice

- Born in Kilkenny, Ireland.
- Fourth of seven sons.
- Wealthy man but his friends & their children were living in poverty.
- He sold what he had in the mission of educating poor and needy children.
- Inspired by Nano Nagle & the Presentation Sisters he opened his first school for boys. At times there would be 150 students to 1 teacher.
- Educational methods were radical for his time. Classes grouped by educational ability & not age; students were not to be physically punished.
- The group of men that followed in Edmund's footsteps were called the Christian Brothers.

Receiving Communion:

We welcome all to the table to receive Communion or to receive a Blessing.





Receiving Communion



Students who have made their first Holy Communion are encouraged to receive the Eucharist at Mass.

With one open hand, placed over the top of the other, Students are to come forward to receive the blessed Eucharist. Say AMEN, place the host in your mouth and bless yourself, before returning to your seat.

Receiving a blessing



If you have not made your Holy Communion, or you are not a Catholic, you are welcome to come forward and receive a blessing.

To indicate this, move forward in the line with your arms folded across your chest in this manner. This will indicate yourself clearly to the Priest or the Minister of Communion. Say AMEN, and return to your seat.
